DIARY DATES

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Dear Parents and Carers,

This week is college production week, and the cast of *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe* have already performed once this week - for year 5 students yesterday afternoon. Their first evening performance is tonight, with three further performances on Friday-Saturday. We wish the cast well and thank those of you who are coming to support the students in their performances.

Reaching February always feels like a bit of a milestone and with the mornings and evenings getting lighter there is a sense that Spring is not too far off. It's a time of year when we can look forward positively and this theme is also one running through the Year 8 options' process. Students have been given information in assembly, tutor time and their RPS lessons to think about the courses they would like to study in years 9-11. Next Tuesday is Options' Evening when they can come into college with you to find out more about what these courses involve.

It is now unusual for schools to allow students to start their chosen course at the start of year 9 rather than year 10 and I thought it would be worth explaining our reasons for doing this as a way of showing what we are trying to achieve with our curriculum. We give three years for students to study options because it:

- Allows students to specialise earlier in the things they enjoy the most and to stop learning subjects they have no intention of continuing with.
- Provides time for important pre-learning in those optional subjects that are not included in the National Curriculum, and which are therefore not taught in Years 7-8. This means that all students can develop the crucial conceptual understanding and cultural capital needed to fully access the knowledge and skills required by the exam specifications. The three-year KS4 curriculum also brings this benefit to those subjects which are taught for one hour per week at KS3, but which get 2.5 hours per week in our Year 9 model for this important pre-learning work.
- Creates the space for students to study four options, rather than just three, as well as maintain timetabled lessons for RE, PSHE and Citizenship (RPS). Although the Year 9 start to KS4 narrows the curriculum earlier than a Year 10 start would, it means there is less narrowing across KS4, with students finishing KS4 having studied a wider range of subjects. This structure means that students have access a broader range of post-16 courses and keeps the curriculum "as broad as possible for as long as possible."
- Enables teachers to enrich the curriculum and go beyond the requirements of the exam specifications. This increases students' experience of each subject's scope and means that they do not have a curriculum in Years 10-11 which narrowly focuses them on passing exams.
- Offers all students the opportunity to pursue the English Baccalaureate, whilst also experiencing a broad curriculum. By creating space for a fourth option, students wishing to study the full Ebacc curriculum have half, rather than a third of their option choices free to pursue wider subjects.
- Enables leaders to plan a curriculum where the pace of learning facilitates deep learning. This ensures the curriculum is not just covered by teachers but understood by students: through talk, discussion, making mistakes and addressing misconceptions. The 3 year KS4 structure creates more capacity for

responsive teaching, with teachers adapting the pace of learning and balancing the need to consolidate and extend

Hampshire County Council has just published its destinations data report which analyses where last year's year 11 students went on to study, following their GCSEs. The key performance measure for schools here is the proportion of students who go on to study a high quality course which meets the government's RPA criteria. Once again, Wyvern students have outperformed those in Hampshire as a whole:



The table below shows the types of courses that student have gone on to study. Overall, 54% of students went on to study at Barton Peveril College, 17% at Eastleigh College and 9% at Peter Symonds College. We are very fortunate to have so many high-quality colleges in our local area for students to choose from.

COLLEGE CULTURE

School Uniform: Why It Matters and How You Can Help

At Wyvern College, we have worked hard this year to increase the amount of praise, recognition, and rewards for students who meet our high expectations. In fact, for every 1 behaviour point issued, we have awarded 18 praise points—a testament to the positive culture we are building.

We are fortunate to already have significant support from many parents, and the majority of our students wear their school uniform with pride. Thank you to these parents for your support and thank you to the students who set a tone of high aspiration and disciplined behaviour by taking pride in your appearance each day and following our uniform policy.

However, when staff have to repeatedly challenge some students on uniform, it works against what we are trying to achieve. It delays learning, takes up valuable teacher time, and creates a culture where other students feel they can test the boundaries. More importantly, it puts unnecessary strain on student-staff relationships, which we are actively working to strengthen.

We need parental support to ensure uniform is not an issue. If every student arrived at school each day in the correct uniform, staff would be able to spend less time challenging dress code breaches and more time focusing on learning and building positive relationships.

Uniform Expectations

There are specific areas where we currently need your support:

Footwear

- Plain black sensible shoes.
- No trainers or "trainer type," boots, toe caps, backless shoes, sandals, platforms, canvas, "plimsole type," or creeper shoes.
- Shoes must not have any logos or labels, such as "Nike" or "Vans."

Trousers & Skirts

- Plain mid/dark grey formal tailored trousers that cover the ankle.
- Jersey fabric is not permitted.
- Trousers should be waist high with no visibility of undergarments at the waist.
- Skirts should be worn at the appropriate length and not rolled up. This is a safeguarding issue—when skirts are too short, particularly when climbing stairs, it can lead to inappropriate situations.

Jewellery & Piercings

- One watch (not a smart watch).
- One plain ring.
- One plain stud in each lower ear lobe.
- Nose studs, retainers, or body piercings are not allowed. The taping of piercings is not permitted.
- Excessive items of jewellery will be confiscated.
- If your child needs to wear jewellery for religious reasons, please contact their Pastoral Leader to discuss what is permitted.

Make-up & Appearance

- Years 7, 8 & 9: Make-up is not permitted.
- Years 10 & 11: Discreet make-up can be worn.
- All year groups: False eyelashes are not to be worn.

Other Uniform Reminders

- No hoodies or sports tops—students should wear a waterproof coat instead.
- No leggings—only tailored trousers are allowed.
- Socks or tights, not socks over tights.

We appreciate and thank all parents who consistently support us by ensuring their child follows our uniform policy, arrives equipped for lessons, and reinforces our school rules—even if they do not personally agree with every one of them. The reality is that we cannot run a school where students pick and choose which rules to follow. That is also not how the world beyond school works.

The more support we have from parents, the fewer uniform challenges we will have to address, and the more time we can dedicate to high-quality teaching and learning.

An exciting 10-week culinary programme for students aged between 14-16 years to enable them to learn how to cook safely while inspiring students to take their first step of their culinary journey with Compass Group. Upon completion of the Junior Chef Academy programme, students will host a special graduation evening, which features their own chosen special menu which they prepare and cook for the guests, including their families.
